## A Hermeneutical Bible Study Method

While this method of Bible study is simple to use, it will take time, especially in accordance with how many questions you ask. <u>Asking good questions</u> is very important to getting the most out of this technique. *Hermeneutics involves interpretation*. And the questions you ask will provide the basis for <u>interpretation</u>, setting you up for <u>principles</u> and ultimately <u>application</u>.

As always, begin by asking God to help you by revealing truths from His Word (Psalm 119:18).

## **OBSERVATION**

- 1. State the Obvious:
  - Write down the verse.
  - Record as many observations as you can about the verse.
  - It may help to work through the verse phrase by phrase.
- 2. Bombard the Text:
  - Ask as many questions as you can about the verse
    - o Who? What? When? Where? Why? How? etc.
  - Just when you think you are finished, ask one more!

## INTERPRETATION

- 1. Answer all the question you just asked. Five ways to help answer your questions:
  - CONTEXT: Read the verses surrounding the passage.
  - CROSS-REFERENCE: Look-up verses to dive deeper (Many Bible and Bible Apps provide these).
  - CONCORDANCE: Look up definitions in a Hebrew Greek dictionary (Strong's, Blue Letter Bible, etc).
  - CULTURE: Note the CULTURE in which it was written using a trustworthy Bible handbook.
  - COMMENTARIES: Commentaries can be used to compare your answers with trusted resources.
- 2. Draw 2-3 principles from the above study.
  - "Principles" are timeless truths that never change.

## **APPLICATION**

- 1. Make an application from your study using the SPECS method:
  - S sin to confess
  - P promise to claim
  - E example to follow
  - C command to obey
  - S stumbling block to avoid
- 2. Pray over these applications now and throughout the day.
